MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

First Steps to Becoming a Leader

Message from LSM Executive Director

In the spring of 2007 Leadership San Marcos took me to a place I would never have otherwise gone. Our class project was a statue of the Tonkawa Chief Placido, and in the course of making a reality of the statue, our project leader, Rodney van Oudekerke, had made the acquaintance of the then, and, I believe, current Tonkawa President Don Patterson. Through their many late night phone conversations, Rodney had eventually arranged for a small delegation from LSM to travel to the Tonkawa nation in Oklahoma, and the trip was made on a weekend at the end of March, when the weather was very much as it is this year.

Our party consisted of Rodney, Eric Slocum, the local artist who had volunteered his time to produce the statue, Lisa Dvorak, a friend of Lisa's named Annette Dunn, and myself. We set out later than planned, for what journey ever goes as planned, and drove north

through one of the most glorious spring days I've ever experienced. In Oklahoma, especially, the land was as it should be in early spring, pretty much bursting with new life. The wind was brisk, and the grass on both sides of the highway rippled in waves. A recent rain had left stock tanks full and puddles everywhere.

We met Mr. Patterson the following morning in town and followed him to his home where our interview moved from the superficial to far greater depths. Mr. Patterson, I believe, felt he had reason to doubt the sincerity of our interest in the Tonkawa tribe and its culture, so he began somewhat cautiously. As it turned out, Annette was a serious student of native American culture, and as time passed, as Mr. Patterson realized at least part of his audience had done a lot of homework, he shared with us the Tonkawa creation myth, the location of the tribe's home in Texas, and a number of important ceremonial articles which he held in trust for the tribe. What had begun with uncertainty on both sides, ended up as a near mystical audience with an authority on Tonkawa life. And, in return, the Tonkawa tribe sent a ceremonial delegation to San Marcos for the unveiling of Chief Placido's statue, enriching that event for all who attended.

One of the benefits of membership in Leadership San Marcos is access to people and places you might not otherwise have had. Under the auspices of Leadership San Marcos, and the friendship of Rodney, those of us on that trip shared an experience we would never otherwise have had, and I have been grateful to both Rodney and LSM ever since for that opportunity.

I'll close with a thought that you have all heard before, and it applies to life itself as much as it applies to Leadership San Marcos. What you get out of it depends, entirely, on what you put into it.

I hope to see all of you at our graduation and annual meeting on April 28 at Price Center. We will be celebrating another class of friends who have shared experiences they would not otherwise have had, through the opportunities offered by Leadership San Marcos.
