Katie was a member of the Class of 2013 and then became the facilitator of the Class of 2014. She is an Admin Training Lieutenant (Paramedic), City of San Marcos Park Ranger, Austin Community College

EMS Professions Faculty and ALERRT Center at TSU Adjunct Faculty. She has a very full life! Along with the many hats she wears in her profession, she has received many awards including the 100 Club of Central Texas "Outstanding EMT of the year" (May 05, 2018), the SM Chamber Shining Star Under 40, a SMHC EMS Community Service Award and various internal EMS awards.

Katie says she joined LSM to learn more about the city of San Marcos. She lived here for 18 years, but had realized she really didn't know much about the area beyond her work involvement. She enjoyed the classes, especially the Historic Tour and Social Services class day (Youth Shelter, HCWC, CASA, etc).

Katie considers customer service as the most challenging and the most rewarding part of her job.

"Really, customer service hits both the high and low points of my various jobs. Customer service is a challenge in that you're having to figure out what people need vs. what they think they want. I enjoy making people happy, but meeting 'wants' is a temporary happy, if you can meet someone's 'needs', especially the ones they may not yet recognize, they'll be happier and more likely to trust and seek you out again. Beyond customer service, I love teaching, so seeing a student 'get' a challenging concept, or watching them teach a classmate something you've shown

them is pretty awesome," she said. When asked, "What's the worst thing you've ever seen?" she replied, "First Responders of all varieties get asked this question frequently. People are curious and don't understand what that question actually means, but you're asking us to relive and tell you about the calls that give us nightmares. I generally deflect the question, I won't talk about specific bad calls, but I'm not rude about it. If they are not in this service, they're not trying to be mean or hurtful, they just don't know the implications of what they're asking."

Katie also wanted to offer her advice on a subject for which she frequently gets asked.

"Taking an ambulance to the ER will not get you seen faster. We give patient report over the radio and we get triaged, just like when you walk in the front door. If the ER is busy, it is busy for us too, and we don't always get to cut in line unfortunately. If you call 911, I'm going to encourage you to be seen for further medical evaluation. We'll work with you, provide medical assessment and evaluation, but there are just some things that I don't have the ability to check that the ER can. If it concerned you enough to call 911, that is reason enough to go in for further evaluation."

Katie says that her favorite LSM memory was when their project was finished.

"We had a great class, everyone worked together well, and we are close still. (I feel like The Square probably misses us. Of course, I couldn't leave out our co-facilitatorship where Karen (Wyatt) and I were

both preggo. That was great," she said. I think this is a great program, and I'm happy to report EMS will have people applying for this fall's class.

Class of 2017 Project Wrap Up

Welcome Sign Dedication & Donation to Greater San Marcos Youth Council

The 2017 LSM class worked with the city's management/permit center/engineering department and agreed on a design that both the city and the class were happy with. Elizabeth Ehlers was instrumental in working with the various city departments to get the sign approved and permitted. After the sign design was approved, Laura Murray started gathering all the in kind donations together and the sign building process began.

Gary Job Corps provided the labor from their award winning cement program. Gary was tasked with laying a level and structurally sound base for the 4-ton concrete sign. They inspected the site and determined that the ground needed to be leveled and compacted with base material.

Pete Quintero of Quintero's Concrete donated his machinery and labor and compacted the ground to make ready for Gary Job Corps and the sign base. Gary came out and poured the base. Heldenfels then made the 4-ton behemoth sign backing. The cement portions of the project took the longest because of the weeks long curing process.



"Once everything was cured and ready, I stepped in

and coordinated the build," said Ernie Valdez, Ernie's Paint & Body Shop. "We needed to rent a large fork lift to carry the behemoth off the trailer that Heldenfels donated for delivery. Problem was that the fork lift driver dropped the fork lift on the wrong street so the driver tried to drive the fork lift across a field to the sign's site. The fork lift sank down to the axles in the mud from a recent rain and would not budge. A quick call to Tony/Barbara Rios of Rios Towing and he was able to help pull the fork lift out of the mud and save the day by pulling the fork lift out because a replacement fork lift could not get to us in time. Rios donated their services to our class project after hearing about the LSM organization and our community project," Valdez said.



Billy Kane of KCLC construction donated his labor and materials to stain the sign and the sign company came out and affixed the art work and lettering. The end result is beautiful and now San Marcos has its newest gateway entry sign located at 1331 N State Highway 123. Thank You LSM class of 2017, community members and businesses.

The Class of 2017 raised enough money for the Gateway Sign and was also able to donate \$5,000 to the Greater San Marcos Youth Council.
